Times are tough! The economy at both the federal and state levels has taken us to a dark place; a place that I never thought I would see. Recently, 6 teachers in my school district (thankfully, no music teachers) were notified that they were being furloughed for next year. I'm hearing of so many music positions being cut across the state. At the PMEA Conference in Hershey there seemed to be a common question floating around during conversations..."well...what's going on in YOUR district?" Simply put...we are in scary times!

I hate beginning my letter to you with such doom and gloom, however, it is a sign of the times and we must address it. I sincerely believe that music is a target for many reasons. First, many believe that music is not essential; that it is nothing more than a frill to decorate a curriculum. Also, I firmly believe that administrators know that, as

music teachers, we adapt. They realize that with fewer music teachers, the rest of us will adjust by taking on more responsibilities because we place so much value on music education. We don't want the students to "go without".

It is our job to make the administration and community realize the importance of music education. We can't do this by fighting for the preservation of jobs. Tax payers don't seem to care about saving teacher's jobs; but they DO care about the students. We must do this through what we do best...education! We need to teach them why music is important, not only to the students but to THEM! Sometimes things need to be "spelled out" in the most basic ways. Here are just a few ideas that I came up with while attempting to compose this letter.

- Try to demonstrate how life would be without music. At the state conference, I heard of a music advocacy group from a school district who was promoting "The Day the Music Died". They were advertising in the local newspapers and TV News Stations for the community to turn music off for one entire day. I really think this would be virtually impossible...but isn't that the point?
- Have your students perform as much as you can. Get them out there in the public eye. People will support the music department more if they can actually see where their tax dollars are going. From elementary through high school levels, the community loves to be entertained!
- Invite the community in to your classroom. Don't perform when they're present...just teach! Let them see the results "on demand". It can be a pretty amazing sight to see!
- Organize a music department faculty recital. We have done this for three years in my district and it is attended by approximately 200 community members each year. During the recital we are very careful to thank the community and administration for their ongoing support of the arts in our district. This recital always has at least two board members and the superintendent present.
- Have your statistics and database of quotes ready to pull out. You may be called upon to defend your area of the curriculum. Have your guns loaded.
- Organize a music advocacy group of parents and community members. These people have influence. Let them help support your efforts!

Here's the bottom line: we can't rest on our laurels. I know that most of us normally don't do that. We are the ones working evenings and weekends until the job is done. But we need to make sure that people notice that and recognize all that we do for the community, the school district and, most importantly, for the students! Perhaps, if cuts are to be made, board members and administrators will realize the important role that music education plays in your districts and will think twice before bringing down the ax.

I want to close with this quote from my arsenal: "During the Gulf War, the few opportunities I had for relaxation I always listened to music and it brought me great peace of mind. I have shared my love of music with people throughout this world, while listening to the drums and special instruments of the Far East, Middle East, Africa, the Caribbean, and the Far North, and all of this started with the music appreciation course that I was taught in a third-grade elementary class in Princeton, New Jersey. What a tragedy it would be if we lived in a world where music was not taught to children."

dvocacy and You by Patricia Bauer, Coalition/PR Chair

If there were ever a time for advocacy, it is now! If you have spent the past few years watching, now is the time for doing. There are record budget cuts being made is the state and many Arts programs are being eliminated. I would like to congratulate the districts whose community members have organized and attended school board meetings on behalf of Music

Education. My district has a very strong group of community members and students who have been attending school board meetings and writing letters, making themselves heard. This is Advocacy at its finest. Besides these grass roots efforts, there are things you can do to influence the people making the decisions. I am reprinting some strategies sent out by our state Advocacy chairman, Rich Victor.

Throughout the state School Districts are considering budget reduction options that would eliminate music program offerings at EVERY level. PMEA members in unprecedented numbers have requested information from me to help in their fight to prevent program cuts. I offer the following to everyone facing a crisis situation:

- 1. The budget process is exactly that...a process. It can be a very painful process, but keep in mind that NOTHING IS IN STONE. All proposed cuts are just PROPOSALS at this time and do not become permanent until your school district budget is passed in June. Even then decisions can be changed, and programs can be restored. The process works by putting every possible cut "on the table" and then waiting to see if there is any strong "push-back" to specific cuts.
- 2. PMEA members are asking for materials and information that will help in their fight. Please understand that in budget battles, there is no printed material, no research document, or magic letter that will be effective. There is very little that an individual music teacher or school district music faculty can do to change a decision maker's mind. THE ONLY EFFECTIVE method for preventing program cuts is large numbers of PARENTS who contact decision makers and tell them that CUTS TO THE MUSIC PROGRAM ARE UNACCEPTABLE! This is the "push-back" that must occur for your program to prevent the proposed cuts from actually taking place.
- 3. Although it is helpful to develop accurate "talking points" for your music parents to use, it is not mandatory. If you use them, then those points must be generated LOCALLY. What is it that students in YOUR DISTRICT will lose by the proposed cut? Keep in mind that at this time, decision makers do not care about research regarding the importance of the arts. They are looking only at dollars and cents and what taxpayers are willing to pay for.
- 4. If you are facing a crisis, then organize your music parents and have them start contacting decision makers (school board, administration, etc.) in person, by phone call, and by email. ONE CONTACT is NOT enough. Decision makers must believe that there is STRONG COMMUNITY SUPPORT for the music program. Shoot for FIFTY messages to every person involved in the budget process. Be PERSISTENT and BE CONSISTENT. Do not stop your efforts until proposed cuts are "off the table."



- Southeast (including the agricultural Black Belt)



ALL students (including VOCALISTS)(except Drum Set) will be asked to improvise 2 choruses of the B-flat Blues as published in the Jamey Aebersold, Vol.2 "Nothing But The Blues", Track 5, "Fast B-flat Blues".

Lead Trumpet will perform assigned excerpt in addition to the required audition piece.

Bass Trombone will use Bass Trombone Book.

Piano – Use regular piano book not the "comping" book. Play written part for Intro & Chorus 1, changes only for Chorus 2 **Guitar** – Play written part for Intro and Chorus 1, changes only for Chorus 2.

Bass/Bass Guitar – Use the "Bass Line Book." Play written part for Intro & Chorus 1; improvise bass line over changes for chorus 2.

Vibes – audition using regular piano book playing the right hand part. Play written part for Intro/chorus 1; Changes only for chorus 2

Drum Set – Play entire tune as written. Drummers will also be asked to improvise style changes

Vocalists – Will also need to improvise using "scat" syllables

In addition to the Snidero book, drummers will be required to demonstrate their knowledge of various styles including (but not limited to) Swing, Latin, and Funk.
