Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA)

is an affiliate of the 65,000-plus member Music Educators National Conference (MENC). PMEA is a service organization to music education in the Commonwealth. The membership includes those engaged in music instruction at all levels, from preschool through college and university, retired educators, as well as those in the music industry.

In addition, college chapters and TRI-M Music Honor Society are comprised of students enrolled in music education. PMEA provides leadership in professional growth and offers special opportunities for musical development to school students.

District One includes over 550 school and private music teachers from Allegheny, Fayette, Greene, Washington and Westmoreland counties. District One sponsors high school and junior high orchestra, band and chorus festivals for members' students who are selected either by tryouts or director recommendation and school size quotas. An honors string orchestra, honors band and honors chorus are offered to student-musicians by competitive audition. District One festival musicians may advance to Region, All State, Eastern Division and National MENC groups.

In addition, District One annually hosts two Jazz Band fests, an Elementary Sing Fest East and West, several Elementary Band Fests and Curriculum/Instruction Workshops for all music teachers.

PMEA's mission is to:

- promote the musical development of all Pennsylvanians.
- advocate for quality music education.
- recognize music education as a lifetime activity.
- support the changing professional needs of its members.
- foster an appreciation of music.

ACT 48 and YOU

There are many opportunities for earning ACT 48 hours at PMEA festivals. We have "streamlined" the reporting system for our membership. Here's what's happening.

FOR THE HOST:

Each host who is offering an ACT 48 workshop at their festival must send a short biography of the clinician and a synopsis of the clinic to Kelly Gressley and Margaret Bauer at the PMEA Executive offices at least 30 days prior to the festival for approval. If this is not done, ACT 48 credit can not be earned

Each host will be given a template to put on computer to have at the workshop, so that the participants can sign in with their Professional ID number at the beginning of the session. At the end of the session, the host can email the list directly to Kelly Gressley at the PMEA Executive Offices. NO more long forms to fill out. Many of the old forms never made it to the PMEA Offices.

FOR THE PARTICIPANTS:

You can still earn 2 hours of ACT 48 credit for a Conductor's evaluation. Conductor Evaluation Forms will be available at all festivals. You must observe the Conductor a minimum of two hours over the length of the festival. To receive credit, you must complete the evaluation form and then mail it directly to the PMEA Executive Offices.

To receive workshop credit, you will be asked to complete the workshop registration template at the festival workshop. YOU MUST HAVE YOUR PROFESSIONAL ID NUMBER! Social Security numbers will not be accepted. NO Professional ID number = NO ACT 48 CREDIT.

And finally....if your home school district offers to you ACT 48 credit for attending the festival as a professional development activity, then.... there will be a form letter at all festivals for you to pick up and send to your home administrator. I will sign and date all forms. NO FORMS WILL BE MAILED TO YOUR SCHOOLS OR TO THE MEMBERSHIP THIS YEAR. You must be responsible to pick up a letter and take it back to your home school with you from the festival.

This should streamline the reporting system and puts the responsibility on the member for their credit. I am looking forward to another wonderful year of PMEA workshops, festivals and activities that we as professionals can share and exchange ideas.





Last year, I decided to do something I have wanted to do for a long time. At the end of the school year, after all the concerts, final grading, and music collections, I asked my students to grade *me*.

Sadly, as I get older, I feel like I am losing my insight to my students. The things I used to understand, I no longer get. I used to be "hip", now – not so much. These students I see everyday seem to be getting harder to read and I felt my perspective on kids was slipping away. As teachers, we know that *knowing our students* is one of our greatest tools. Therefore, instead of trying to read my students, I decided to ask them.

First word of caution: I do not recommend this to everyone. I know I could not have read these evaluations objectively (or without offering my resignation to the school board effective immediately) ten years ago – I wasn't ready. Also, if you teach middle school, beware! Those monsters can be mean. However, now that I have some experience under my belt, I wanted a student's perspective on how I can be a better teacher.

From the start, I decided I was only going to ask the hard questions. I wasn't going to ask "What things does this teacher do well?" I think we all have a good sense of what we do well, and I wasn't trolling for the ever elusive "'atta boy". Instead, I wanted to know "On a scale from 1 to 10, how effective does this teacher use his class time?" or "What is the first thing you would change if you were the director of this group?" I used a combination of rating-style questions and open-ended questions, and took a great deal of care to ensure that kid's privacy was protected and that the questions were unbiased.

Second word of caution: Know what is important and what is not. It goes without saying that you can ignore "why do we have to do music from dead people?" and "your smiley-face tie is awesome". Throughout the entire results, I had many comments that were duly noted and discarded (seriously, no – we can't have every Friday off). But I also learned many things that I



did not recognize about my teaching, and I received wonderful insight on the thought process of my kids as they reflect on their time in my class. I learned that I rarely look to the kids on my extreme right and left, and that I should be more patient when introducing difficult music for the first time. I made a list of the most common constructive criticisms and made goals that addressed them for the coming

year. I also decided to wear the smiley-face tie on the first day of school.

Whatever you do this year, find something you can do to improve your teaching. We as music educators have been entrusted with a great gift. We have access to kid's emotions other teachers will never see. Our kids will love, cry, rejoice, and reflect thought the music we teach, and we owe it to them to be the best educator we can be. Strive to make students the center of your teaching and continue doing great things for kids.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve you for the next six years. I look forward to meeting many new faces in that time, and I wish you the very best school year to date. Evaluations welcome!





A few items of note that were brought up during the August 2007 District 1 EXCOM meeting:

All State Changes

Housing – the state will not provide housing for students after their concert if it is early in the conference. This applies to any students in the **All-State Chorus** for this year.

Jazz Ensembles – Once a student is accepted in a jazz ensemble, they are no longer eligible for any other ensemble.

Digital Photos – All Regions are now REQUIRED to submit digital photos of students to the PMEA Executive Office by the conclusion of the festival **with their names**.

Finances/Treasury

All financial paperwork is to go through Steve Leopold, our District 1 treasurer. There was some confusion over this last year, and several reimbursement requests, etc., were paid directly by the state office. Steve will have no record of the transaction if you go directly to the state; and will therefore have an inaccurate balance.

A reminder to honors festival hosts: all Honors festivals are to be run through the District ${\bf 1}$ treasury.

All festival hosts are to have any financial obligations (district and state dues, profit fee, etc.) within one month of the festival. There are still hosts with outstanding balances from the 2006-07 school year.



PMEA District 1 has a system of "Email Alerts" available to all members. They are used to keep members informed about developments in music education, advocacy, district and state association announcements, etc.

The emails are sent as "blind copies", to protect the privacy of members. Some districts and internet providers have spam blocking software which may not allow you receive these emails. It is always easier to be an advocate for music at the beginning of the school year. Of course we all have new challenges to face, but with the freshness of a new school year ahead and new opportunities before us, the enthusiasm we have felt before returns and keeps us on our game. Take advantage of the new school year. There aren't many professions that allow "do overs" as it were. We have the advantage of a fresh start with a new group of students.

Now is the time to think about Open House or Curriculum Night. This is the first opportunity many of you will have to meet parents and show them that we are not the "Department of Entertainment". Please make use of these times to show parents how you use the state and national standards in your classroom. Let parents play a classroom instrument, sing a song, clap a rhythm or participate in another activity that their child does in class. Show slides or videos of their children in action while learning is taking place.

This may be the only opportunity to talk to parents that



isn't attached to a performance. Take advantage of it. Plant seeds. Discuss ways that parents can participate in their children's Music education in more ways than helping backstage. You might suggest opportunities for families to attend concerts of different kinds. Give parents questions to ask their children that

reflect the standards. Encourage them to be part of the educational process. Showing parents what kids need and what they can do can be the best advocacy tool of all. It all starts with YOU.



It's been another busy summer highlighted by a landmark happening for PMEA Adjudication! At the State Board meeting in July, a selection committee convened to choose, for the first time in many years, an ensemble to perform at the 2008 In-Service Conference that qualified through the Adjudication system. A total of 95 bands, orchestras and choruses participated in at least one Adjudication Festival last spring. 34 of those ensembles qualified by earning 'straight 1's/Superior Rating' to apply for the new performance slot dedicated to PMEA Adjudication. Applications and recordings were received from 10 directors, an outstanding response for the first year. The ensemble selected will be announced soon along with all the other groups chosen to perform at the conference next spring.

Adjudication festivals for Jazz Ensemble were approved for 2008 following a successful pilot festival at State College HS last April. Please contact me if you would like information concerning how to host or participate in this exciting new component of PMEA Adjudication.

All members are invited to regularly check the PMEA website for adjudication information. A link on the home page will take the viewer directly to a page dedicated to PMEA Adjudication that includes the most up-to-date 2008 Adjudication Calendar, comprehensive guides to participating in and hosting festivals, the Selective Music Lists, evaluation sheets and all involved forms.

The registration fee for large ensemble festivals has been increased by \$20 to \$150 for the 2008 festivals, but now includes a CD recording of the ensemble's on-stage performance and the cassette tapes for the judges. The fee should not increase further for the foreseeable future, as we do not wish the registration fee to become a disincentive to participate.

District 1 is a proven leader in supporting PMEA Adjudication as the host of six of the eleven festivals initially scheduled for spring 2008. Additional hosts are welcome and can be added to the calendar at any time.

Citation of Excellence

During the 2007-2008 school year an elementary school teacher will be recognized. Twelve teachers, one from each district, will be cited with pictures and other appropriate information. They will be honored guests at the Annual Luncheon during the in-service conference. Please consider submitting a nomination by completing the application form available in the "Library" section of pmea.net. Applications are due to D1 president Dennis Emert by **November 1, 2007.**

District 1 Scholarship

The Scholarship Committee has developed the following criteria for awarding three music scholarships to students in our district. Each award will be \$500.00.

- The recipient must have definite plans for a career in music education or music-related field.
- Three scholarships will be awarded each year; one in strings, one in wind/percussion and one in vocal music.
- The award will be based on music achievement and academic excellence.
- 4) An applicant must currently be a senior in a District 1 High School and a participant in the current District 1 Festival. A student's placement in the festival is not a factor in granting the award.
- Two recommendations must accompany each application. One recommendation must be written by the student's home school Music Director PMEA member, and one must be written from any of the following: private music teacher, high school teacher in any discipline, guidance counselor, church music director, or high school principal.
- 6) The student must include with the application and recommendations, the following: a) a high school transcript, b) an essay on why music education/music is important, why the student wants to pursue a career in music, and future ambitions and goals upon graduating from high school and college.
- Completed applications must be mailed to the Scholarship Committee Chair by April 1, 2008 to:

- The award recipients for the District 1 Scholarships will be announced at the recipients' spring concert. A PMEA officer will present the award.
- Applications will be available in the fall newsletter and at Honors and District 1 SHS Festivals.
- 10) The committee reserves the right to give no award in any area where applicants are not deemed qualified.

Irene Christman Scholarship

One outstanding senior music student will be selected to receive a \$1,000 dollar college scholarship. Applications are available at pmea.net and should be submitted to the state office. Deadline is March 19,2008.

Outstanding Superintendent Award

This award is given to a superintendent who has demonstrated active and continuing support for an outstanding and well balanced music program in his/her school district. It is given in recognition of that support and the importance PMEA places on the cooperation necessary between administration and faculty for successful educational programs in the public schools of Pennsylvania. Applications are due by **November 1**, **2007** to D1 president Dennis Emert.

William Nash Continuing Education Scholarship

The William Nash Continuing Education Scholarship provides one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per one school year to a person who has been accepted into an accredited music graduate program. The applicant must meet the following criteria to apply:

- The applicant must be a full time employee of a school in Pennsylvania for at least one year prior to the application.
- The applicant must show evidence of acceptance into a music graduate program.
- 3) The applicant must be a current member of PMEA and must have been a PMEA member in good standing for the one year prior to application.
- 4) The applicant must be a citizen of the United States of America OR have resided in the United States of America for the past five years.
- 5) The applicant must be a new teacher, defined as being their first, second or third year of teaching.
