(PMEA) is an affiliate of the 65,000-plus member Music Educators National Conference (MENC). PMEA is a service organization to music education in the Commonwealth. The membership includes those engaged in music instruction at all levels, from preschool through college and university, retired educators, as well as those in the music industry.

In addition, college chapters and TRI-M Music Honor Society are comprised of students enrolled in music education. PMEA provides leadership in professional growth and offers special opportunities for musical development to school students.

District 1 includes over 550 school and private music teachers from Allegheny, Fayette, Greene, Washington and Westmoreland counties. District 1 sponsors high school and junior high orchestra, band and chorus festivals for members' students who are selected either by tryouts or director recommendation and school size quotas. An honors string orchestra, honors band and honors chorus are offered to student-musicians by competitive audition. District 1 festival musicians may advance to Region, All State, Eastern Division and National MENC groups.

In addition, District 1 annually hosts two Jazz Band fests, an Elementary Sing Fest East and West, several Elementary Band Fests and Curriculum/Instruction Workshops for all music teachers.



# Professional Growth Through PMEA Adjudication

One of the core goals of PMEA Adjudication is "to establish *PMEA Music Performance Assessments* as a must-do, priority event of choice each year for all directors throughout the state due to the significant educational benefits for participating students".

As an NFL replay official often states, 'upon further review', it is clear that the words 'and themselves' need to be added to that statement.

Ensemble directors who participate in one of the available assessment contexts within PMEA Adjudication----Band, Orchestra, Chorus, Jazz Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble and Solo/Small Ensemble-----have a tremendous opportunity for meaningful professional growth.

Each of the three adjudicators is asked to identify areas of strength within the performance to reinforce what is indeed working, feedback that is meaningful in that it helps validate the director's efforts, is certainly reassuring, and, realistically, helps the director be more open and receptive to suggestions. A balance between positive and critical comments must exist for the learning climate to be effective.

Obviously, the adjudicators are also asked to target areas of concern throughout the performance. Directors should welcome those comments as opportunities for learning for themselves as well as for their students. We urge any director with anxiety or trepidations of any kind to set aside those barriers. Instead, realize that this feedback is like no other in its relevance and potential for improvement.

The 'play by play' commentary on cassette tape from three adjudicators is particularly valuable for the director. While some observations about the performance at a given moment simply state the obvious----wrong notes, blown counting, or some kind of 'oops' ----others dig much deeper with insights about tone, technique and expression that are both relevant to that point in the music and transfer for future use.

The written comments on the new Assessment Forms address overall strengths and concerns along with suggestions for improvement. Adjudicators should be able to capture a holistic perspective of each ensemble in their wrap-up comments both on tape and in writing, including focused strategies and direction for 'the next steps' for directors to take back and use right away.

And, the ratings themselves offer quantitative feedback in each of the five key assessment areas with a number and descriptors that provide a snapshot of that performance. The +/- column enables the adjudicators to provide additional holistic input on the significant criteria within each assessment area.


Both the feedback and the rating are absolutely critical to effective assessment---and meaningful professional growth for directors----in this adjudication context.

Band and orchestra directors also benefit from the sightreading component. The challenge can be exhilarating. Preparing for and experiencing sight-reading at adjudication develops individual and ensemble skills that are valuable in their own right and definitely transfer to any rehearsal and performance.

Don't forget the powerful relevance of comments about the 'art of conducting' in real time. The adjudicators should be able to offer commentary that reinforces effective conducting and that offers suggestions for adjustments at a particular moment in the music----opportunities for truly relevant growth in this area that can't be found in an article or at a workshop. (As an aside, DO seek out conducting master classes as amazing opportunities to develop awareness and technique.)

Also, don't overlook how a student's performance in solo/small ensemble assessment can help the director. Comments by the adjudicator----a specialist on that instrument----should both reinforce what the director already knows about the overall musicianship of the student(s) involved and provide additional in-depth observations and improvement strategies.

I found my adjudication experiences as a high school band director to be among the most profound of my career in terms of focused, 'real' professional growth opportunities. The 'artistic rush' I experienced from participating is one I'll always treasure, regardless of the range of ratings received. The hardest decision is the first 'I'll do it'; one I strongly assert that you will NOT regret!

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# THE SECRETARY OF EDUCATION WASHINGTON, DC 20202

#### August 2009

Dear School and Education Community Leaders:

At this time when you are making critical and far-reaching budget and program decisions for the upcoming school year, I write to bring to your attention the importance of the arts as a core academic subject and part of a complete education for all students. The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) defines the arts as a core subject, and the arts play a significant role in children's development and learning process.

In June, we received the 2008 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) in the Arts results for music and visual arts. I was reminded of the important role that arts education plays in providing American students with a well-rounded education. The arts can help students become tenacious, team-oriented problem solvers who are confident and able to think creatively. These qualities can be especially important in improving learning among students from economically disadvantaged circumstances. However, recent NAEP results found that only 57 percent of 8<sup>th</sup> graders attended schools where music instruction was offered at least three or four times a week, and only 47 percent attended schools where visual arts were offered that often.

Under ESEA, states and local school districts have the flexibility to support the arts. Title I, Part A of ESEA funds arts education to improve the achievement of disadvantaged students. Funds under Title II of ESEA can be used for professional development of arts teachers as well as for strategic partnerships with cultural, arts, and other nonprofit organizations. In addition, the Department's Arts in Education program supports grants for model program development and dissemination and for professional development for arts educators. Moreover, local school districts can use funds under the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act for the arts along with other district expenses.

Because of the importance of the arts in a well-rounded curriculum, the Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) plans to undertake a survey to assess the condition of arts education in grades K-12. This fall, elementary and secondary principals will be asked about their schools' offerings in music, dance, theater, and visual arts. Next spring, NCES will survey elementary classroom teachers as well as music and visual arts specialists at the elementary and secondary levels about their programs and resources. In early 2011, the Department expects to begin reporting findings from this comprehensive profile, the first since the 1999-2000 school year. This data will help practitioners and policymakers make more informed decisions about arts education.

# VITAL SIGNS: Taking the Pulse of Music Education

These sessions include: Tips for Concert Programming (band, orchestra, and chorus); Musical Theater and Allied Arts Resources; Arranging for Your Ensemble (instrumental and vocal); Percussion for the Non-Percussionist; and Multi-Cultural Music in the Curriculum.

As usual, this "learning community" which has developed will be held on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving in the University Center at CMU. It is a great way to usher in the holiday season, renew acquaintances, interact among colleagues, learn from peers, and earn Act 48 hours—and it's all free to PMEA members. Please refer to the flyer in the newsletter for details on the sessions, presenters, registration and parking. Check the vital signs of your program and improve the wellness of music education. We hope to see you there!



**Drum Set** – Play entire tune as written. Drummers will also be asked to improvise style changes

**Vocalists** – Will also need to improvise using "scat" syllables

The motion was stated to place pre-selected excerpts for the lead trumpet audition on the PMEA Honors Jazz audition list. The excerpts will be used in a rotating basis. An appointed selection committee of the Honors Jazz West participating directors will select the excerpts. The excerpts will then be previewed by the participating directors at the 2007 festival and then placed on the PMEA District 1 website. Passed Unanimously
